



Tasmania's four distinct seasons deliver unique travel experiences year-round.


Average temperatures in summer, from December to March, are 17–23°C (63–73°F).

Port facilities

Located an easy 800m walk from Hobart's city centre, the Port of Hobart can accommodate two cruise vessels concurrently up to a maximum length of 349 metres LOA.

Macquarie Wharf No. 2 and 3 are the primary cruise ship berths in Hobart and are home to the Cruise Passenger Terminal.

Additional cruise ships are accommodated at the adjacent multiuser berth at Macquarie Wharf No. 4 and 5. On arrival, shore excursion coaches are staged alongside the ship at berth and passengers can access additional visitor services via a short 400m walk to the Macquarie Wharf No. 2 Cruise Terminal.

PORT ARTHUR



This craggy peninsula plays host to the haunting Port Arthur Historic Site, 300m-high sea cliffs and the epic Three Capes Track. Access is via Teralina / Eaglehawk Neck, a 30m-wide isthmus once guarded by dogs to deter convict escapees.

Get captivated by history, lost in an underground world of art and dazzled by natural wonders - the south is full of surprises.

Port facilities

Located on Turrakana / Tasman Peninsula, Port Arthur houses a well-sheltered anchorage within proximity to the World Heritage-listed Port Arthur Historic Site.

Suitable for a range of cruise vessels and up to large ships, the anchorage offers a short tender to a dedicated tender berth inside the historic site, which offers a range of experiences for cruise passengers and acts as the gateway to a range of broader experiences located on the Tasman Peninsula.

The city of Burnie has developed a strong reputation as a popular cruise destination over many years and is the gateway to a range of experiences around North West Tasmania.

The Port of Burnie is a busy industrial port and Tasmania's second busiest cruise ship destination.

Cruise vessels up to 295m LOA can be accommodated at one of three multiuser berths, which are a short drive to the Burnie city centre.
